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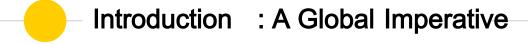

- Key Trends International migration, population ageing, and COVID19 are reshaping global health systems.
- Call to Action: Healthy ageing must be inclusive of all individuals—irrespective of background or ethnicity (WHO 2017; UN 2018).



- Legal & Ethical Frameworks
 - Swedish Health Care Act (SFS 2014:82)
 - WHO, UN values on equality, dignity, respect for beliefs and customs.
- Core Principle Health care should be individually appropriate and rooted



Health Risks

- Psychosocialdisorders (esp. in women)
- Low socioeconomic status, discrimination, age onarrival (Reus-Ponset al., 2018)

Barriers to Care:

- Social isolation, poor access to services language & cultural barriers (Salma & Salami 2019 Giebel et al. 2015).
- Outcome: Lower utilization of nursing homes and delayed care (Molsa et al. 2019; Basic et al. 2017).



BestPractices

- Respectidentity, routines, and beliefs (Montayre et al., 2018; duToit & Buchanan, 2018).
- Avoid assumptions—understand personalstories and health behaviors (Purnell & Paulanka 2008).
- Outcome: Improved satisfaction and care quality (Giebel et al. 2015;Plejert et al. 2014).



- Main Aim: Person centered, diversity-sensitive care rooted in social, political, and economic awareness.
- Educational Tools:
 - Interactive Learning Tutorials, internships, guided reflections.
 - Digital Resources Videos, interviews, real stories from practitioners and patients.



Content Focus

 Communication styles, decision-making, gender issues, racism, family roles (Epner & Baile 2012).

TargetAudience:

 BA & MA students,professionals(nurses, doctors, social workers), university educators.

Implementation & Impact

- WP4: Involve 200+ stakeholders—policy makers, service managers, health educators.

Stakeholder Engagement

 Direct input from older migrants via storytelling and participatory methods.



- Policy-Level Aim: Develop best practices and standards for EU level adoption.
- Curricular Gap No steady integration of ageing & diversity in current HE programs.
- Transferability:
 - Applicable in higher education, vocational education, and adult education.



- Vision: Build socially responsible care systems that see the person, not just the patient
- Sustainability: Promote inclusive, high quality care across Europe
- Next Step: Collaborate across academia, policy, and practice to transform healthcare education.
